Ringling speeches by a man and several women before the equal suffrage in general, the Susan B. Anthony amendment to the constitution in particular; the forming of a New Mexico state branch of the Congressional Union for Equal Suffrage with Mrs. Joshua Reynolds, of Albuquerque, chairman, the raising of \$350 in cash for the cause; the making of plans to induce congresses to take speedy and favorable action on the amendment; the passage of suitable resolutions and finally, a group photograph of the women.

The attendance in point of numbers was left much to be desired and women in the audience were disappointed. The show was blamed by many for the small turnout. But the women and few men who did attend the conference made up with their enthusiasm for the upathy of their sisters and brothers who failed to respond to the call.

The hall of representatives was beautifully decorated with flags and banners in the colors of the union—white, gold and purple. Attractive young ladies, wearing scarves of the union's colors, and selling suffrage literature, greeted every one with a smile. Cut flowers and ferns added to the pretty scene. And then there were speakers, prominent in the city, state and nation.

The first speaker of the evening was Mrs. E. St. Clair Thompson, southern secretary of the union, and Miss Doris Stevens, national organizer of the union. They held the audience spellbound with their addresses; they talked almost in conversational tones and they threw every element of personality into their utterances, and struck such a note of justice and demand for the privilege of self-determination that they were given ovations as they concluded.

Mrs. Rupert F. Asplund, of this city, introduced the speaker and presided at the meeting. With the opening address, Mrs. Asplund, in the name of the organization, declared that there is no hope for equal suffrage in New Mexico except by the passage of a federal amendment to the constitution and she urged the immediate formation of a state organization to accomplish that end.

Mr. Kenney, a champion of the first speaker on the regular program was Attorney John J. Kenney, of this city, who made a hit with the ladies by declaring: "It is an approval of the house, the judiciary committee. She told of the plans to see the amendment out of the committee room and said: "Excuse me, but we believe we are walking 'em up.' Warm applause greeted this utterance.

**RESOLVED** that the speakers and members of the committee be invited to give a public hearing on the suffrage amendment at the city hall, Santa Fe, on Wednesday, March 1, 1916, at 10 o'clock a. m.
