Solon Formally Asked to Vote for Anthony Amendment

AFRAID HE CAN'T ACCOMMODATE 'EM

U. S. Senator Thomas B. Catron this afternoon found it his painful duty to decline to accede to the request of the Santa Fe suffragists that he use his influence for equal suffrage. "It looks to me," said the senator, "as if you are asking me to do something not exactly right when you ask me to go to Washington to help pass an amendment to give the ballot to people who have stated plainly that they don't want it."

Many Are Taxpayers

Mrs. Rupert F. Asplund made the next speech, pointing out that many of the women of New Mexico are taxpayers and property owners, and thus are entitled to the ballot. Her whole argument was chiefly along this line and was a trenchant one. A deputation of 160 Santa Fe women made a public net of faith in the cause of woman suffrage this afternoon, parading through the principal streets in automobiles and then proceeding to the residence of U. S. Senator Thomas B. Catron on Grant avenue, where four brief speeches were made, formally asking the senator to work for the Susan B. Anthony federal amendment to the constitution when he returns to Washington. The object of the formal "net" on the senator shortly before ten this today was not to endeavor to force him to commit himself, it was explained, but to show him the sentiment of women of his home city on the suffrage question.

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Articles Amended

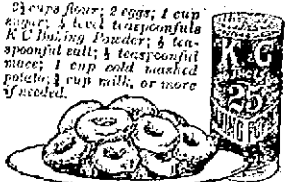

Doughnuts That will remain molat. Every necessitate who takes her own bread knows that if a little potato is added to the sponge, the bread will not dry out so quickly. In this recipe potato is utilized to make doughnuts that will remain moist and fresh for several days.

K. C. Potato Doughnuts By Mrs. Nevada Briggs, of Lakewood, Wash. 2 cups flour, 2 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup lard, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup potato flour, 1/2 cup yeast, 1/2 cup salt, 1/2 cup oil, 1/2 cup water.



Sift three times, the flour, salt, spice and baking powder. Beat eggs with rotary beater, add sugar, then work in the milk and potato flour with a spoon and alternately add milk and flour mixture. Make a soft dough, roll into a sheet, cut into rounds, punch a hole in the center with the finger and fry in deep fat.

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
